

REQUIREMENTS FOR TYPESCRIPT SUBMISSION

Material sent to the editorial board shall be original, not been previously published in other printed publications.

All materials should be submitted to the editorial board by e-mail: tik@ksu.edu.ru (for Svetlana Gennad'yevna Smirnova).

The electronic version of the article is prepared in the Microsoft Word processor (*.doc, *.docx, *.rtf). If you use a non-standard font, please attach to the letter a copy of the article in *PDF format as well as a file with the font. What is given as the filename is the author's first, middle and last name (e.g. Ivan Ivanovich Ivanov.doc).

All articles are checked for textual borrowings by the Anti-Plagiarism system. The editorial board accepts articles with originality at least 80%. When checking, <http://www.antiplagiat.ru> is used.

The typescript of the article shall meet the following requirements: format A4; margins two and a half cm on each side; Times New Roman font; type size 14; line spacing 1.5; please indent the paragraph by 1.25 cm.

The maximum of the article, including abstract, keywords and bibliography, shall not exceed 14 pages of typewritten text.

The abstract shall be 100-120 words. The number of keywords shall be 7-10.

Name, patronymic (if any) and surname of the author, name of educational institution, organisation (place of study, position), title of the article, the abstract shall be presented in both Russian and English.

Funding information (references to grants, etc.) shall be given in parentheses immediately after the title of the article.

References shall be presented in the order of mention. References in the text of the article should be in square brackets, indicating the publication number in the reference list and pages. For example: [1, p. 256], [2, vol. 5, pp. 25-26]. After the list of references in Russian in the article the transliterated list of references shall be presented. When making the reference list in Latin (References), the Russian-language sources need to be transliterated, whereas the foreign sources, given in accordance with transliteration requirements. When transliterating, <http://translit-online.ru> is used.

Units are given according to the International System of Units (SI).

Figures, charts, diagrams. No more than four figures are accepted as illustrations of articles. They shall be placed in the text of the article in accordance with the logic of the presentation. Reference to a specific figure, for example (fig. 2), shall be given in the text of the article.

Diagrams should be filled in using a hatch or in shades of grey; all elements of the diagram (text blocks, arrows, lines) shall be grouped together. Each figure shall have a sequence number, a name and an explanation of the meaning of all curves, numbers, letters and other symbols. One should save an electronic version of the figure in *.jpg, *.tif formats (greyscale, at least 300 dpi resolution).

Tables. One should provide each table with a number and a title. Tables shall be provided in the Microsoft Word processor, placed in the text of the article according to the logic of the article. A reference to a particular table, e.g. (Table 2), shall be given in the text of the paper. The structure of the table shall be clear and distinct, each value in a separate row (table cell). All table columns shall be titled. Simultaneous use of tables and graphs (figures) to present the same results is not allowed. The use of smaller type size in tables is possible, but not less than 10.

Formulas are only executed in the MS Equation formula editor.

Decimal fractions have a decimal point (0.78) as the separator, and when listing decimals, each one is separated from the other by a semicolon (0.12; 0.087).

Construction of an article

Please observe the order in which your article is structured!

One does not need to number each new paragraph, but the order of the article shall follow the list below.

Branch of science and speciality.

UDC index (assigned in the library by the title of the article and keywords).

Name, patronymic (if any) and surname of the author (long title).

Academic degree and academic status.

Full name of the organisation, city, country - the author's place of work or study.

E-mail address for each author.

Mailing address with a postal code (for subsequent mailing of the journal) and a contact phone number.

Title of the article (abbreviations in the title are not acceptable).

8a. (Reference to the grant or source of funding, if any.)

Abstract (100-120 words).

Keywords (7-10 words or word combinations carrying the main meaning of the text).

Text of the article.

References (indicated in the order of mention, numbered).

Rules for the abstract of a research article

The abstract is a brief description of the text in terms of its purpose, content, form, and other features. It conveys the main, the key idea of the text before familiarising with its full content. The scientific abstract is conventionally divided into three parts:

Presentation of the issue or problem, the article is about.

A description of the research progress.

III. Conclusions: Results achieved by the study.

No additional information (biographical data, historical background, lyrical digressions, arguments, etc. are allowed in the abstract). Excessively complex sentences shall not be used in the abstract text and the presentation should be in a scientific style.

Phrases recommended for writing an abstract for a research paper:

The problem... is dealt with in this article...

The idea that... is justified by...

The topic... is dealt with in the paper...

The comparison is given...

The article is a comprehensive study of...

The problems... are dealt with in the article...

The article focuses on...

... is analysed in the article.

The author concludes that...

The author focuses on... in the work...

Characteristic features are highlighted and described ...

The article is devoted to the topical problem...

New material on the investigated topic is summarised in the article ... is introduced into scientific parlance...

The proposed approach will be of interest to specialists in the...

It is about... in the article...

The article is devoted to a detailed analysis of...

Practical experiences are summarised...

Characteristic features are explored in the article...

The author provides a general characteristic...

Concepts... are analysed in the article...

The analysis of the views of certain researchers is given in the article...
